We have built a pet shelter that is a true shelter for Madison County's homeless dogs and cats, a stopping place between being homeless and being cared for in a loving family. Hundreds of healthy dogs and cats, each with his or her own personality, have been saved from neglect or worse because you have been there for them.

You've helped us improve our fencing and increase our feeding and cleaning from once to twice each day. Your support has allowed us to do renovations that improved efficiency. Many of you have been invaluable by providing foster homes. You were great supporters of our Fun Run this spring.

We, in turn, have helped the community by offering reduced-cost adoptions whenever possible. A generous grant from the Humane Society of the Ozarks allowed us to bring the Rover mobile spay/ neuter van to Huntsville, and 80 pets were sterilized in one day. Most were also microchipped and vaccinated. That translates into hundreds fewer unwanted puppies and kittens in the coming year.

And we still need you.

As Thanksgiving and Christmas approach—the season of giving—please don't forget Paws and Claws Pet Shelter. **We're going through a rough patch and have reduced our hours and vet costs**, but we believe that with your help, we can thrive and continue to provide Madison County with the best little pet shelter in the state. The dogs and cats don't feel entitled to your support, but they deserve it.

Hope keeps us going



An old, sick, tired golden retriever came to our shelter through the kindness of those who found her. Our shelter staff called her Hope, a deeply appropriate name, because it captures our philosophy.

Hope was never viewed as hopeless. She was given another chance at life and responded in full measure. She's in her forever home now, safe and content. Her adopter said this recently:

Hope is very sweet, but it goes beyond that. She's just so loving. I don't know what she has been through (she flinches easily, and is afraid of brooms, leashes, gunshots) but she's such a big bundle of love. Over and over, I've seen her choose affection over food and treats, turning away from her bowl or a biscuit on the ground in order to be petted. All of my other dogs seem to love her (one sleeps near her, another grooms her face when he can reach it).

If your old dog were lost and somehow came to us, she, too, would be treated with kindness and hope.

These are Spay Arkansas's normal costs (add \$5 if your pet does not have proof of a rabies shot):

Cats \$30

Dogs under 50 lbs. \$50

Dogs over 50 lbs. \$1 per lb.

Most, but not all, services are income-sensitive. To learn if you qualify or to learn of special programs, go to **spayarkansas.org** and click on Clinic or call 479-756-1100. Income limits start at \$33,350 for a household of one person.

Some Dogs are Transported to Far-away Homes

The drivers turning in at Walgreens at 4:30 a.m. have the parking lot to themselves. Car doors open and people emerge to start walking dogs and puppies, getting them comfortable for the long trip ahead.

Next, volunteer driver Ann O'Malley arrives, her small van fitted with cages, blankets and supplies, ready to transport these shelter dogs to rescues many states away.

Two of these dogs are from Madison County's Paws & Claws Pet Shelter, ones that have been at the shelter for months without anyone expressing an interest in adopting them.

"My goal is to increase adoptions locally, and to use transporting as a last resort," says shelter manager Shonna Harvey. Still, "It is very much a life-saver," and has been ever since the shelter became a no-kill facility in August 2014. It can take weeks to find a rescue willing to take a dog, then get the paperwork completed in time for the dog to leave on the next transport.

The practice is not cheap. All dogs must be spayed or neutered, up to date on shots (including rabies), heartworm tested, and given a clean bill of health by a vet before they can go on a transport. Add their living expenses during the months they were housed at the shelter, and the total amount the shelter has spent is well over \$150 per dog, none of which is recoverable. The receiving rescue finds the dogs homes, and keeps all adoption fees, while the transport drivers are volunteers who use their own vehicles and ask only for a small donation to cover gas expenses.

According to a story that aired on National Public Radio last January, some shelters are in need of adoptable animals. "With the growth of pet rescue groups, the demand for dogs now outstrips the supply of those available for adoption in many states." The report cited a New England shelter that increased adoptions from 300 animals per year to 4,400 in 2013, three-quarters of these coming from out of state, including



Puerto Rico, Nebraska and Georgia. The exact number of dogs being transported from state to state is unknown.

Despite other states' stricter spay and neutering laws, Harvey says this hasn't resulted in a scarcity of dogs. "It's just that they don't have certain breeds that we have here," she says, citing Colorado's over-abundance of pit bulls and refusal to take in



more. Its Rocky Mountain Lab Rescue, however, takes Labradors and Lab-crosses and has a waiting list for chocolate Labs. "While not purebreds, appearance is important. For example," says Harvey, "the ears have to be Lab ears that's the main criteria."

The law of supply and demand means that only dogs are transported out of state. "I'm not aware of a cat rescue that takes them," Harvey says. "I don't think anyone has a shortage of cats."
